## **COURSE OVERVIEW**

The course is designed to instruct professionals in successful evaluation and treatment of children with complex feeding and swallowing disorders. Multi-disciplinary research based information pertaining to pediatric feeding disorders in the inpatient, outpatient and clinic setting will be presented with emphasis on treatment techniques to work with children with feeding aversion, behavioral feeding disorders, failure to thrive and prematurity. This course will also focus on the special topics of autism, cleft palate, cerebral palsy, Down Syndrome, developmental delay, visual impairment and treatment of the multi-challenged child. Fraker and Walbert's Food Chaining Program<sup>©</sup> will be demonstrated and discussed to help participants introduce foods in a systematic, non-threatening manner. Participants will write food chains during the second day of the course. DVD case studies will be utilized to enhance learning and facilitate audience interaction.

### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

By the conclusion of this course, the participant will be able to:

- specify oral **sensory motor techniques** to improve lip seal, cheek activation, tongue position and jaw stability;
- demonstrate understanding of the use of **cervical auscultation** as part of the bedside evaluation of the swallow;
- demonstrate knowledge of the complexity of pediatric feeding disorders and the need for **multidisciplinary assessment and treatment**;
- write comprehensive treatment programs for the fragile and/or multi-challenged child;
  identify appropriate nipples, bottles, cups and utensils to use as tools to safely feed while promoting development and strength of the oral facial musculatures
- describe the techniques of **food chaining**, flavor mapping, transitional flavors/foods and use of the rating scales for evaluation of progress. (Fraker/Walbert);
- implement programs to meet the needs of the non-oral feeder.
